Beatrix Potter (1866-1943) is well known for her classic children's books, narratives, and charming illustrations, all beginning with Peter Rabbit. Yet, she is that and much more. From artistic, literary, and scientific influences and inspirations from the Victorian era, Potter evolves in her own right as an artist of place, a keen observer of nature in her watercolors and her scientific discoveries, a savvy business woman in the world of publishing and merchandising, a rural farmer, and a great conservationist of England's Lake District. Though a woman of her times, she also looks forward to ways that women define and carve out their own lives. This lecture will explore all these levels of her artistry, biography, and legacy—still significant to her 21st century readers and admirers.

Independently, each was invited to bring their visions and expertise to public venues across Northern America. This class will familiarize you with the aesthetic and political backgrounds of the artists and their partnerships with students, university trustees, Edsel Ford and John D. Rockefeller, Jr. Those murals which remain on display in New York, New Hampshire, Detroit and California will be emphasized.

Sonia Delaunay: A Modern Language of Color

Sonia Delaunay was an avant-garde artist who spent her life experimenting with the language of color and abstraction. She developed a varied practice, giving equal weight to design and fine art.

While remaining faithful to abstract painting, she created innovative designs in typography and textile prints. She crafted handmade garments and ready-to-wear fashion and designed costumes for theater, ballet, and film. She also created tapestries and mosaics as well as cutting edge interior designs. Born Sara Stern in a Ukrainian shtetl in 1885, she became a crucial presence in the artistic and intellectual Zeitgeist of 20th Century Paris

Guerrilla Girls: The Art of Behaving Badly

An anonymous group of activist women artists, The Guerrilla Girls, have been fighting since 1984 to expose biases in the art world. They doggedly advocate for equal representation in museums, galleries, and other arts organizations around the world. In order to maintain anonymity, they wear gorilla masks in public and take the names of dead women artists as pseudonyms. Their crusade began with a poster campaign that targeted museums, dealers, curators, critics, and artists who they felt were actively responsible for, or complicit in, the exclusion of women and non-white artists from mainstream exhibitions and publications. Come and hear how these women, the “conscience of the art world,” have used wit and irony to tackle issues of gender and racial discrimination in the art world and beyond.

The Unique History of U.S. Political Parties

Our Founding Fathers were opposed to the creation of Political Parties and consequently, there are no provisions in the U.S. Constitution about their involvement in the nomination of candidates for public office. Despite this historical fact, Political divisions immediately created political parties. We will examine the unique aspects of U.S. Political Parties over time and how it effects todays politics. This will include (a) the birth and demise of major parties such as the Federalists and the Whigs, (b) the evolution of Thomas Jefferson's Democratic - Republican Party to Andrew Jackson's Democratic Party, (c) the creation of party nominating conventions, (d) the rise of party Primaries, (e) the conditions that led to the creation of the Republican Party in the 1850's, (f) the effect of third party politics, (g) how todays two major parties have switched positions on issues such as trade, race, and government regulation. We will also discuss two twentieth century Presidential Elections that led to major political party realignment.

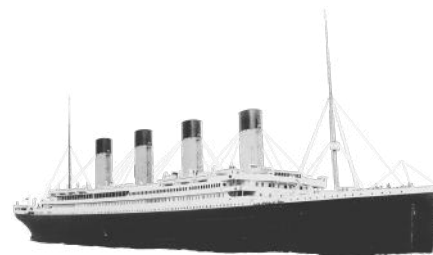
Unsinkable Titanic Children

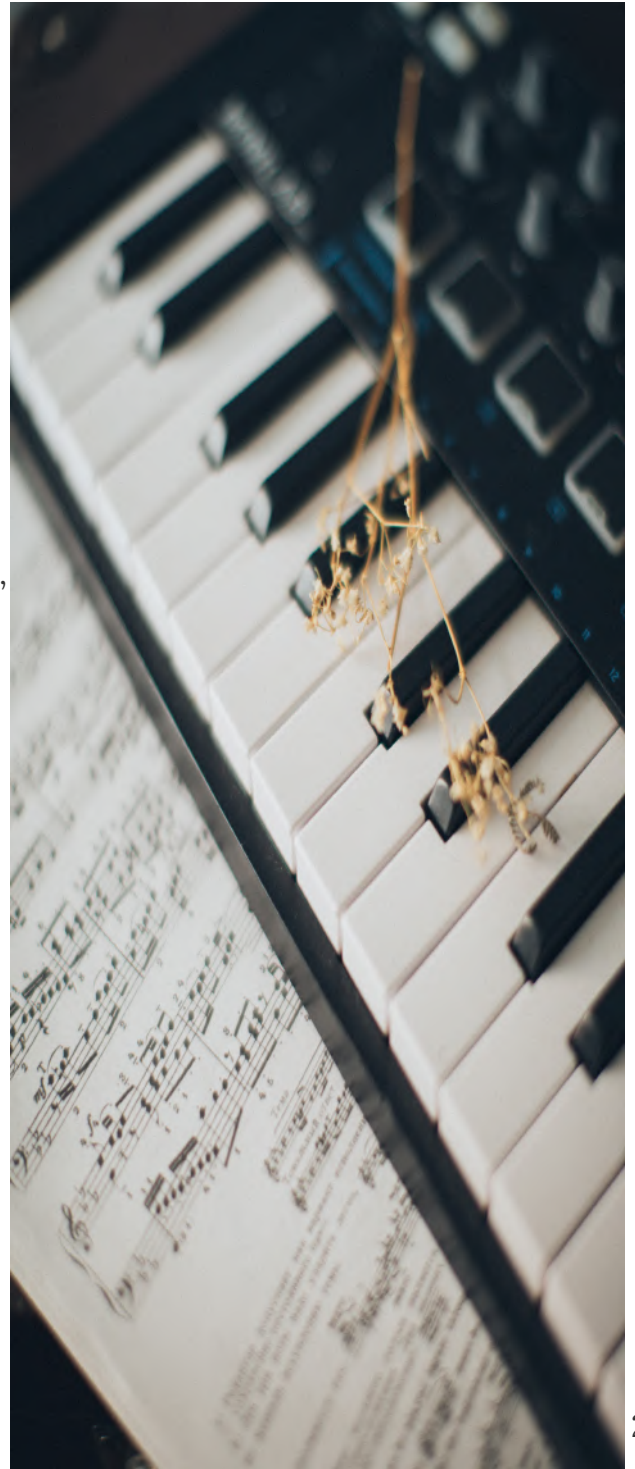

A Trip to Walden by Way of the Modern Age

“I am convinced...that to maintain one’s self on this earth is not a hardship but a pastime, if we live life simply and wisely.” These words from writer/philosopher Henry David Thoreau could have been written today. Instead, they were written over one hundred and sixty years ago when Thoreau first published Walden, or, Life in the Woods (1854). Although it appeared these many years ago, it is startlingly modern, grappling with the same issues that we are at the beginning of the 21st century: climate change, sustainability, wildlife conservation...and more. We are dealing with the very essence of survival, both human and animal. Its lessons and advice speak to us today with even more urgency than they might have had in the 19th century. Writer Bill McKibben envisions Thoreau today as a “cultural and spiritual seer,” someone who reminds us of our partnership with Nature and what we must do to preserve it. In our review of Thoreau’s classic work, we will select readings from the book, look at the art of the Hudson River School, and consider the lessons that Walden has to teach.

Despite its fairy tale façade, which is now mostly ruins, Bannerman Castle was built by a Scottish patriot as an arsenal for military surplus that still lies beneath the castle walls. You may spot the "Bannerman's Island Arsenal" cast in concrete on one of the castle's remaining walls. Today we cruise aboard the Estuary Steward down the Hudson River to visit Bannerman Castle where we'll visit the ruins, gardens and summer residence while learning about all things Bannerman on an intriguing walking tour. Be on the lookout for Bannerman's artistic details of his native Scotland like Shamrocks and thistles, along with military motifs, a personally designed crest, and special sayings handcrafted on each fireplace. Before our island adventure, we'll spend some time in the Hudson town of Beacon, where you can visit the amazing Dia. Housed in a former Nabisco box printing factory, Dia's collection of art from the 1960s and '70s represented in individual galleries fashioned specifically for the creations can only make you say, Wow. Spend as much time as you wish at the gallery, grab some lunch downtown and browse the shops.

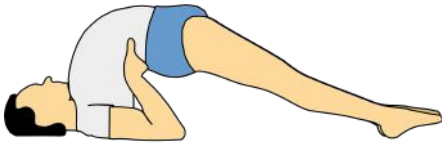

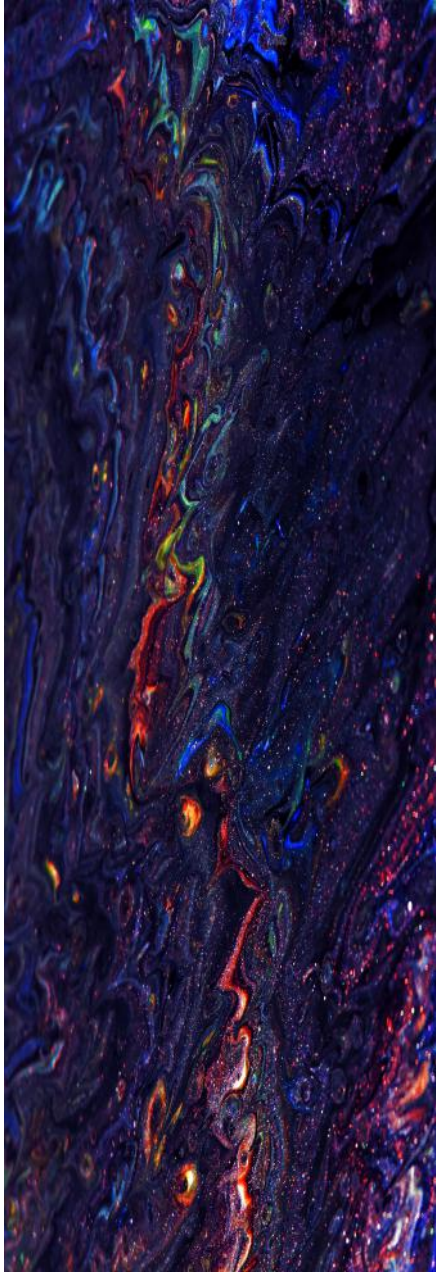
